Gramley Residence

You enter the front doors through the vestibule leading into a wide central hall. On the left is a large living room and to the right is a formal study. To the rear of the hall is the kitchen with a formal dinning room that opens to a screened porch which overlooks the gardens. The first floor also consists of an office and half bath. The open stairs leads to four large bedrooms and a full bath on the second floor. The four fireplaces and pocket doors are original characteristic of this Stately Colonial Style home.

Attorney Leverett Simpson built this house in 1912 from plans in an architectural magazine and supervised every detail himself. The garden walk leads to a Gazebo out behind the house. This home originally had a widow's walk accessed through a separate stairs in the attic.

In 1937 the residence was sold to the Genesee Conference of the Methodist Church for the official residence of the District Superintendent. The well-known Rev. Norman Vincent Pearle's father was the first superintendent to occupy the home. The Rev. Mr. Pearle was a frequent visitor during this period, often writing in the garden Gazebo.

Mr. & Mrs. Allen Heckel purchased the home in 1961; it has been the home of Mr. & Mrs. Gramley for the past three years.

The Coat Hanger

In 1903 Albert J. Parkhouse arrived to work at The Timberlake

and Novelty Company in Jackson, Michigan. He went to hang up his coat and hat and found all the hooks were in use. Annoyed he picked up a piece of wire and bent it into two large oblong hoops opposite each other twisting both ends at the center into a hook. The company thought it was a good idea and his employer applied for a patent on January 25th, 1904 and U.S. Patent #822,981 was granted and assigned to John B. Timberlake. The company made a fortune. Parkhouse never got a penny.
